I was initially introduced to the San Diego Association of Black Social Workers while I was working as a waitress and as a student at Cuyamaca College studying Social Work. One day, a very charismatic customer started a conversation about the career field that I was interested in pursuing. She mentioned a non-profit organization that she was part of and handed me her business card. A little over 2 years had passed when I decided to pull out that old card and finally attend a monthly meeting.

As a first-generation college student, I was extremely nervous and felt underqualified. However, this group of Black professionals believed in me. SDABSW current student membership number is small but growing. I strongly recommend that every Black student studying human services attend at least one meeting. There was many times where I've felt overwhelmed with my studies and unsure of whether or not social work was the career for me. As students, we oftentimes focus solely on course material and do not know what applying the concepts that we learn about actually looks like. Seeing the drive and passion of these members helped push me to excel in both my studies and helped me to define and make a commitment to serve my community.

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Project New Village and Councilmember Honor San Diego Association of Black Social Workers By Barbara Greer, Loretta Swanegan and Patricia Kelly

Each year, Project New Village pays tribute to Fannie Lou Hamer by hosting a celebration in her honor. During the celebration, Project New Village honors individuals and community organizations who demonstrate the qualities that Fannie Lou Hamer espoused in the areas of voting, social justice and food equity/food justice.

While we are in the midst of one of the most important voting seasons in the history of America, we must pay tribute to Fannie Lou Hamer, not only for her work in the field of food equity/justice but also in trying to instill the importance of voting amongst Black people. As a civil rights activist/leader, she was often on the front line of danger as she placed her life in peril trying to get Black people to vote.

Mrs. Hamer is famously known for her saying of "I'm sick and tired of being sick and tired." Having started working in the cotton fields of Mississippi at the age of 6 and quitting school at 12 years old to work to help her family (she has the youngest of 20 children), and suffering poor health, it is understandable that she was indeed "sick and tired of being sick and tired." In addition to spearheading voter registration drives, she worked tirelessly to help minorities establish businesses, childcare services and other family services.

Some of the things she did during her short lifetime (she died at the tender age of 59) included co-founding the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party, running for Congress, and establishing the National Women's Political Caucus. While she was not successful in her bid for Congress, she successfully brought the country's attention to the plights of Mississippian experiencing civil rights (Cont. next column) struggles and injustices when she spoke at the televised Democratic National Convention in 1964.

This year, SDABSW was chose by Project New Village to be honored along with several other agencies and individuals.

Loretta Swanegan, the President of the CABSW and Treasurer for SDABSW is quoted as saying

"While we do not do what we do for accolades and fanfares, it felt wonderful knowing that we are noticed. And being honored for work that we do that is aligned with Fannie Lou Hamer's legacy was wonderful. Fannie Lou was very instrumental in leading voter registration drives and we are working diligently to get our people out to vote. It was an awesome event and an honor being selected this year."

Patricia Kelly, former SDABSW President said

"I enjoy going but I especially enjoyed it this year. Having it outdoors on the patio made it easier to network. I also like how Diane Moss continues to incorporate food fresh from the Mt. Hope Garden into the celebration meal.

SDABSW Thanks Diane Moss of Project New Village for recognizing and honoring us with the Fanner Lou Hamer 2018 Food Equity Award. The award was given to us "in recognition of active support and involvement in changing the food landscape in Southeastern San Diego." We will continue to live up to this honor. We also thank Councilwoman Georgette Gomez for presenting SDABSW a Special Commendation at the Fannie Lou Hamer celebration.
